Women members enjoy a pathway into UNISON

Thirteen women from the Branch who attended a 2 day residential Pathways course in the Jurys Hotel, Aberdeen in November 2009 described the experience as enjoyable and inspiring.

The Pathways course is aimed at women members and new activists who would like to find out more about UNISON and to see how the skills they already have can be used in a union setting. It also has the advantage as with all UNISON training, of being done in paid time off work.

"I really enjoyed the day and felt a great sense of being part of something bigger, and hearing everyone's stories. I have a meeting coming up with a manager and feel much better about tackling it after the Pathways day." Bernadette

Lynne Duncan, Organising assistant, who organised and tutored the course said, "It went really well. All the women who came along took part fully in the event and I think got a lot out of it – they are all certainly more informed about UNISON and how the skills they already use in their everyday life are transferable to participating in the union.

"We don't push anyone to get involved at the end of the training but all the participants agreed to recruit within their workplace and to attend the branch AGM next year. On top of this, several have agreed to be contacts and some have agreed to become stewards," added Lynne.



"This was a great group of women to work with—they made my job very easy. Most of them had never met before but because they were all so open and friendly it was like they had known one another for years. There was a wealth of talent and skills

on the training and I hope everyone left feeling more confident about using their skills both in the union and in everyday life. I'm really looking forward to meeting up with everyone again soon." Lynne Course tutor

Why public services are so important

Affordable and value for money

Kate warned, "We need to get across the message that if these services are cut back or privatised the increased costs of paying for them individually can only increase the cost burden on hard-pressed families. We estimate

the average household gets more than £10,000 a year in benefits from public services. Public delivery provides value for money through economies of scale and stopping shareholders taking profits out of the pot. A year's domestic waste collection sourced privately would cost

The average household benefits by more than £10,000 a year from public services.

around £2,500, and the average cost of a year's education outside the public sector in Scotland is around £8,200."

Important for the economy

Bob Revie, Branch Secretary added, "But it is not just that public services are essential for all of us. They also play a key part in the economic well-being of our communities. Cuts in public sector jobs, pay and pensions will only lead to less money being spent to stimulate the economy, and if public services were cut they would order and contract less with the private

"Far from being the drain on the economy argued by those who created the economic crisis, the public sector contracts for supplies and services from the private sector - especially important

when private industry faces reduced order books.

A just and fairer society

"In addition money spent in the economy by public service staff will not be there if we accept the advice of the right wing think tanks to cut jobs, pay and pensions. Now is the time to build a fairer society based on social justice, good jobs and quality public services. It is up to all of us to highlight the importance of public services and to get across the message that Public Works!" said Bob.

"We sometimes take public services for granted and dont actually consider the level of public services that we use. From this point of view I am sure there are many ways that public services support me both within the family home, within the community and at work. UNISON Scotland has produced a leaflet 'A day in the life...' demonstrating the importance of public services to everyone's lives and pointing to the huge costs that would fall on people if public services were not available. The leaflet follows an average woman through her day and points out our dependence on public services - from water and sewerage, through environmental health and refuse collection, to education and health care. It points out that all of us rely on public services,

whom they can be a lifeline.

"Health care is second to none and my family have had nothing but good experiences. My father who sadly passed away and my mother have had fantastic help from the care services. My partner is from Thailand where you have to pay for virtually all services. Some areas in towns only get running water for a couple of hours a day or even every second day. When we return from there we appreciate the public services which we take for granted." Ian, Turriff

Joint unions submit pay claim for next year and call for fair treatment for low paid council staff

UNISON and the other unions representing Scottish local council workers, submitted our claim for an annual pay rise at the annual meeting of the negotiating body, The Scottish Joint Council in Edinburgh, on 25th November.

This claim is for the period starting in April of this year when the current agreement ceases. The claim is for a one-year rise of 3% or £600 (whichever is the greater)

with a significant underpinning for the low paid – including a claim for all workers to be paid a living wage of at least £7.00 per hour.

Ian McDonald, Branch Treasurer said, "Local councils have already



agreed to pay their chief officials 2.5% over this period, and teaching staff 2.4%. It would be invidious if our political leaders now try to make the lowest paid staff pay for the economic crisis. Bankers and fat cats in the city get help – it is time for hard-pressed public service workers to get that help."

"Our members in Scotland's local councils have already delivered around £200m worth of efficiency savings with a loss of around 7,000 jobs. It is only fair that councils should share these efficiency savings with staff as well as with council tax payers."

UNISON secures council pledge to consult staff and unions in Playgroups review

UNISON along with GMB and Unite met with management representatives of the council's education service in November to discuss the implications of the forthcoming review for playgroup staff and secured agreement on full consultation and no changes to Playgroups and staff until the review is completed.
